The 2015 Women of Worth support a wide range of causes and projects :

- Maria Rose Belding "" Washington, D.C.; Pre-med student at American University who created the MEANS Database, an interactive website allowing food pantries and soup kitchens to quickly coordinate exchanges of excess food items between each other and from local donors.

- Catherine Curry-Williams "" Valley Village, Calif.; Founder, Shane's Inspiration, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing communities around the world with resources to build inclusive playgrounds for children for all abilities.

- Elissa Davey "" Vista, Calif.; Founder and CEO, Garden of Innocence, a nonprofit organization that provides personalized, dignified burials for abandoned children (up to age eight), many of whom were found abandoned or have passed away in hospitals and left unclaimed by their parents.

- Jaha Dukureh "" Atlanta, Ga.; Survivor of female genital mutilation and Founder of Safe Hands for Girls, the only American nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering and educating young girls and communities about the dangers and effects of FGM.

- SuEllen Fried "" Prairie Village, Kan.; Co-Founder, Reaching Out From Within, a nonprofit that provides rehabilitation services for prisoners through expert-led, intensive discussion sessions and training programs that help them understand the reasons behind their

violent behaviors.

- Teri Kelsall ““ Laguna Woods, Calif.; Co-founder, The Jonas Project, an organization dedicated to helping veterans with an entrepreneurial drive develop formal business plans and prepare pitches for start-up capital. The organization offers low interest loans for business expenses, and mentorship from network of Veteran entrepreneurs and business professionals.

- Kathy Koenigsdorf ““ East Islip, N.Y.; Founder, Jake Koenigsdorf Foundation, raises money for substance abusers who want help but cannot afford treatment centers. Founded after Kathy's son, Jake, died of an overdose at 21-years-old.

- Schinnell Leake ““ College Park, Md.; Founder, Extra-Ordinary Birthdays, a nonprofit that organizes individualized birthday parties for homeless children to make them feel loved and valued.

- Alison O'Neil ““ Atlanta, Ga.; Founder, Beauty Becomes You, a nonprofit that provides aesthetic treatments including hair, skin, nail care, and massage therapy, to the elderly, a population often overlooked, in an effort to bolster self-worth and combat "Failure to Thrive Syndrome."

- Melaney Smith ““ Athens, Ga.; Founder, Books for Keeps, an organization that provides 45,000 books each year to children in need to prevent them from falling behind in school during a summer without books.
